Marine Corps Air Station Yuma 2023

Marine Corps Air Station (MCAS) Yuma continued operations as the busiest Marine Corps aviation facility during Fiscal Year (FY) 23. The installation manages the Marine Corps' largest tactical aviation training range, which spans over 10,000 square miles of air space designated for military use in Arizona and California, consisting of the Barry M. Goldwater Range-West (BMGR-W) and the Chocolate Mountain Aerial Gunnery Range (CMAGR). MCAS Yuma delivers a unique opportunity for units to operate a full spectrum of munitions all year round.

Every year, MCAS Yuma supports two Weapons and Tactics Instructor (WTI) courses. WTI is a seven-week course consisting of advanced tactical aviation training designed to produce Weapons and Tactics instructors.

The courses, hosted by MAWTS-1, bring thousands of highly experienced and fully qualified U.S. Marines and Sailors from many aviation communities around the globe including select joint personnel from the U.S. Army, U.S. Air Force, and allied forces.

In FY23, MCAS Yuma was selected for having the best Community Education and Outreach Program in the State of Arizona.



The Radar Regionalization project picked up momentum in 2023 resulting in MCAS Yuma gaining control of airspace west of El Centro. This increase of airspace and capacity will be an enduring effort to support current F-35 training operations.

In addition, the Community Planning & Liaison Office was awarded \$5 million for a Readiness and Environmental Protection Integration (REPI) project and the Range Conservation division secured approximately \$1 million of the Department of the Navy's Climate Change Resiliency funding. The Range Conservation Division administered 27 agricultural leases on 1,400 acres adjacent to the MCAS Yuma airfield, reducing potential encroachment, minimizing Bird Aircraft Strike Hazard, and generating \$506,249 in reimbursable funds for the installation's use of natural resource projects.

INDUSTRY

The Sonoran Desert is the perfect environment for a number of defense activities, making it an ideal home for both MCAS Yuma and U.S. Army Yuma Proving Ground. According to the Yuma Chamber of Commerce, the military is the second largest industry, generating approximately \$900 million towards the local economy, with MCAS Yuma contributing approximately \$600 million annually.


In 2023, MCAS Yuma supported 22 military units and training events consisting of 270 aircraft and approximately 4,500 military personnel. Rotational units consisted of Marine, Navy, Army, and Air Force elements from throughout the continental U.S., the Atlantic and Pacific Fleets, and Foreign Military Units training on the air station. During FY 23, these units spent an average of four weeks in Yuma during their deployments. They pay living expenses such as housing and purchase items like food, clothing, and gasoline. In result, their money is also cycled into the local economy. An estimated amount can be found on page 12.





Within MCAS Yuma's Airfield Operations is the Air Traffic Control (ATC) division. This division is responsible for the safe, orderly, and expeditious flow of all military and civilian air traffic operations into and out of MCAS Yuma and Yuma International Airport's assigned National Airspace and designated Special Use Airspace.



The Control Tower Branch is responsible for aircraft operating on the airfield and within MCAS Yuma's Class "D" airspace. This airspace encompasses a five nautical mile radius from the center of the installation covering from surface to 2,700 feet mean sea level (MSL).

The Airfield Services Branch provides direct support to the WTI courses and numerous wing and ground deployment operations. The Fleet Liaison Marines coordinated 20 Deployments for Training (DFT) to MCAS Yuma, involving 10,058 flight hours, 270 aircraft, and 5,579 sorties.

The primary mission of MCAS Yuma is to support aerial weapons training for the Atlantic and Pacific Marine and Navy Fleet Forces.







TRANSIENT PERSONNEL IMPACT

The economic impact, as computed for 2023, does not include any expenditures of the approximate 166 transient personnel on cross-country flights that remained overnight in Yuma.

RANGE

MCAS Yuma's Range Conservation division established and maintained 38,815 recreation permit user accounts for the BMGR-W. In addition, Conservation Law Enforcement Officers made 2,635 public contacts, responded to 16 calls for wildlife assistance aboard the air station, assisted 12 disabled motorists on the BMGR-W, assisted U.S. Border Patrol in the apprehension of 1,257 undocumented immigrants, and issued 11 citations for trespassing, unauthorized off-road travel, and illegal hunting.

MUTUAL ASSISTANCE

MCAS Yuma Federal Fire Department provided 639 emergency and non-emergency services, including 235 automatic and mutual aid to neighboring fire departments such as City of Yuma, Rural Metro, Somerton, and Imperial County. The installation's Range Control (LEG IRON) coordinated support with external agencies for six separate medical emergencies, four of which involved major incidents with trespassers and undocumented immigrants.

AIRSHOW

After a three-year hiatus, MCAS Yuma reopened its doors to the local community for its annual Air Show. Through military demonstration teams, static aircraft displays, and aerobatics, MCAS Yuma provides a remarkable performance to thank the community for its continuous support. In 2023, an estimate of 17,000 spectators attended the event.










COMMUNITY SERVICE

Through the Single Marine Program, Yuma-based Marines participated in 345 events where nearly 8,000 volunteer hours were recorded. In addition, MCAS Yuma continues to positively impact the community through 10 Adopt-A-School initiatives, the Marine Corps Junior Reserve Training Corps program at Kofa High School, the Juvenile Justice Court "Successful Futures" Program, and two Yuma Young Marine Chapters. MCAS Yuma also hosted seven school tours and attended two school events as guest speakers. H&HS squadron provided 12 color guard performances and 14 burial details.




PROVOST MARSHAL

The Provost Marshal's Office Military Working Dog (MWD) section partnered with U.S. Customs and Border Protection to expand relations and learn new perspectives and tactics of dog handling from other working dog services. In addition, MWD conducted five demonstrations as an educational opportunity. The Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) team handled 51 response calls, operations, and training events. The EOD team assisted with 11 incidents of Unexploded Ordnance, one deceased motorist on the CMAGR, and three suspicious packages aboard MCAS Yuma.



TOYS FOR TOTS

VMFT-401 personnel, with the assistance of volunteers from MCAS Yuma, conducted the Toys for Tots drive, which collected and distributed 11,236 new, unwrapped toys in 2023. The local Marine Corps Reserve Toys for Tots Program impacted 8,500 children in Yuma County during the Christmas season.







MCAS YUMA STATION POPULATION RECAPITULATION











MCAS YUMA'S FEDERAL CIVILIAN EDUCATION LEVELS








